A Thought about the "Objective of Education" Essay by Dr. Inazo Nitobe

SASAKI Tsuyoshi, Professor, Tokyo University of Marine Science and Technology, and Director, the Minato UNESCO Association



Dr. Inazo Nitobe is well known for his remark, "I wish to be a bridge across the Pacific Ocean." I trust many UNESCO association members are aware of this remark. Having been a man of cultural and international mindsets, he authored the legendary book "Bushido," and introduced Japan's culture to many foreign countries. He also took an active role in the League of Nations as Assistant Secretary General. In addition, he helped with the foundation of the International Committee on Intellectual Cooperation (ICIC) which was the president of the UNESCO.

At the same time, Nitobe was highly respected for his scholastic achievements. For example, he learned agricultural policy and applied the knowledge to the restoration of agricultural policy in Taiwan, thereby enhancing the economic affluence of Taiwan. He also served as the principal of the Dai-ichi High School, today's Faculty of Liberal Arts in the University of Tokyo, and as the president of the Tokyo Woman's Christian University. He was a great educator who produced many promising graduates.

Among Nitobe's many publications, I'm especially interested in his philosophy about education. The "Objective of Education," among others, was written to express his wish, while on tenure as the Principal of the Dai-ichi school, that the students acquire knowledge of liberal arts. He classified the objective of education into the following five categories:

- 1. Education for profession
- 2. Education for leisure
- 3. Education for ornament
- 4. Education for the guest of truth
- 5. Education for enhancing personality

I'd like to elaborate on the fifth category "Education for enhancing personality." Personality refers to the vertical relationship where an indivisual objectively perceives the "transcendental person" and himself, and passes his own judgement and takes necessary action. Nitobe asserted that, based on the vertical relationship, it is necessary to establish a horizontal relationship, namely sociality or a man-to-man relationship.

Maeda Tamon, who was among the students Nitobe taught at the Dai-ichi school, and who made an initial effort to enable Japan's participation into the UNESCO, gave the following remark in his memoir:

Dr. Nitobe was respected not only as the principal of the Dai-ichi High School but also as the topnotch educator in social studies. He always emphasized the importance for his students to establish a horizontal relationship in addition to a horizontal relationship. He wanted each of us to get together and cooperate horizontally so as to establish a good society. (To be continued on P. 2)

I believe that Dr. Nitobe's concept of personality and sociality is still valid for our society. The world is facing multiple difficult challenges today. I'd like to put into practice the said horizontal and vertical relationships in daily life, and strive to realize a societal well-being by cooperating with many friends.

Donation to Mindanao Children's Library Foundation, Inc. (MCLF)

About Mindanao Children's Library Foundation (MCLF)

MCLF is a locally established corporation founded in 2002 by Mr. Matsui on the farmland at the foot of Mt. Apo, a suburb of Kidapawan City, located in the center of Mindanao Island, the Philippines. Their main activities are as follows:

- (1) Storytelling and reading to local children and to indigenous, Muslin, and refugee children
- (2) Support for scholarship students
- (3) Medical support
- (4) Construction support of nursery
- (5) Afforestation support, and others

Scholarship students and young children from different religions and different tribes live and study together and participate in various activities. These activities are made possible by donations from a large number of supporters from Japan.

Relationship between Minato UNESCO Association (MUA) and MCLF

In October 2005, Mr. Matsui gave a lecture at the International Scientific Council on the theme of "MCLF Operations and Medical Activities in Mindanao, where Terrorism and Fighting Continue". It was the first time that we learned about the reality of conflicts and dire poverty in Mindanao. Immediately, we started supporting activities. Some of the MUA members contributed money. Some members brought donated items to the MUA office. Some even asked their friends and sent donated items in boxes to the MUA office.

Regarding the shipping, we pack shoes, stationery, clothes, daily necessities in the designated cardboard boxes, and then, we ship boxes to Mindanao by sea. At the beginning, Ms. Nagai who introduced Mr. Matsui to us, and Ms. Takai, former President of MUA, donated the shipping costs. Later we in charge of packaging donated items shared some shipping costs. We considered this donation activity as a part of our core MUA activities. Since 2022, the shipping cost has been allocated in the annual MUA budget. It is a relief to receive a thank-you letter for donated items from MCLF about a month later.





Young people from MCLF visited MUA

In June 2018, Mr. & Mrs. Matsui visited Japan with scholarship students. Following Mr. Matsui's lecture, the young people performed ethnic dances and songs. Also, they gave speeches about "My family and my way of life in the future". We were impressed to know that they have grown up fine. We saw in the movie the task of covering the blown-up roofs with blue vinal sheets. It showed the harshness of the reality which made us aware of the need for assistance. We believe that we must continue the donation activity. To keep this activity, we need your support. The weather there is summer all year round, so we need to ask summer clothes, and old curtains, which can be used as bedding. There are children with no shoes, so we need shoes as well.

We appreciate for your understanding and support.

The "Kanto Block Convention" for the 2023 fiscal year will be organized by the Tokyo Council of UNESCO Association (TCUA) and held at Aoyama Gakuin University on September 3rd. In preparation for this event, 80 members of the TCUA gathered for a lively seminar under the theme of "Collaboration and Building Comradeship!"

The event began with a welcome address by President IKEDA of TCUA, followed by youth activity reports, a report from the Next Generation of the Japanese National Commission for UNESCO, and a summary of activities over the past year through the 2000-Person Project Action Progress Report.

Mr. AMAKO Yoshihiro delivered the keynote speech on "Recent Developments of National Federation of UNESCO Associations in Japan and Expectations for Block Study Group" (photo on the right).

Finally, the participants engaged in cross-association group discussions regarding the "overall theme and planning for the Kanto Block Convention." Divided into 11 groups, they shared active opinions and made



presentations on flip charts. The discussions, including topics such as peace, a world without war, equal education, poverty issues, perspectives from countries affected by atomic bombings, joining hands, and smiles, provided valuable direction for the practitioners involved in preparing for the upcoming autumn convention.

In particular, we would like to report that the "youth," who will carry the torch for the next generation, actively participated in the morning youth training seminar, youth activity reports, and group discussions as facilitators.

World Cooking Workshop Chinese Medicinal Food

Date: Sunday, February 22, 2023 Venue: Minato Gender Equality Center Libra

With the pandemic concerns seeming to decline, we have decided to increase the capacity of this event from 16 to 20. Participants included 17 Minato citizens, 3 MUA members and 5 staffers.

Ms. Yamaguchi, today's instructor, hosts a Chinese medicinal cooking class named "Mandarin Kitchen". With several international licenses, she is fully qualified as a traditional Chinese physician, and started the workshop by explaining the Yin-Yan Five Elements theory which originated in China. Citing the famous saying "a balanced diet leads to a healthy body", Ms. Yamaguchi went on to describe what kind of food ingredients are good for the cold and warm seasons respectively. For example, to help improve physical conditions and refine beauty in winter, she recommends ingredients that are black in color and good for kidney health, such as black beans, black sesame, brown sugar and kelp. Regarding taste, she advises to choose sea salt flavor found in Hijiki seaweed, kelp and wakame seaweed.

Below are ingredients that warm up the body:

Garlic, Chinese chive, red pepper, Japanese pepper, star anise, clove, cinnamon, brown sugar, fragrant olive, trout, horse mackerel, and salmon

Ingredients that expel negative energy from the superficial parts of body are as follows (winter through early spring):

White Japanese leek, ginger, Shiso leaves, bay leaf, myoga, mitsuba parsley, keishi and Hamabofu

To take good care of the body in spring, it is advisable to use green vegetables and sour-tasting food, which are expected to increase blood quantity and boost circulation. Taking a walk is also good for health, according to Ms. Yamaguchi.

Today's menu was put together by choosing ingredients that are suitable for winter through spring. Ms. Yamaguch did a demonstration first, and then the participants enjoyed practical cooking.

Chinese Medicinal Cooking Menu

- 1. Black bean rice to steadily supplement nutrition to the kidneys
- 2. Shrimp and Chinese chive wontons to warm up the kidneys, which otherwise could cool down your body, and enhance the function of liver.
- 3. Chicken and burdock soup with grated daikon to warm up the body, improve intestine health and revitalize will power.
- 4. Sweet soup with black sesame dumplings to supplement nutrition to the spleen and kidneys, thereby invigorating the body.

Ms. Yamaguchi had kindly done all the groundwork in advance, such as preparing soup stock, azuki beans and black beans, sesame paste, black sesame dumplings and others, allowing participants to enjoy cooking smoothly. We tasted the finished food, which was delicious, and many people raised their voices in surprise: "I feel my body warming up!" This is the very essence of the medicinal cooking, and I would like to hold a Yakuzen workshop again sometime in summer or winter.

In Memoriam: Mr. MATSUMOTO Hiroshi

Mr. Matsumoto, who had made great contributions to MUA for over 30 years as Vice President and Director, passed away on March 21, 2022 at age 91.

I still have a vivid memory of his image when he attended MUA's conference for the first time.

Tall, slim and clad in chic double suit with a bow tie, he had a bowler hat in his hand. He looked just like a typical British gentleman in a movie.

Once he started to speak, his voice was unexpectedly powerful and clear. He made a shy comment, "I trained my voice in the cheering squad when I was a student." Even 30 years thereafter, his style and voice stayed the same.

He majored in architecture at Waseda University and later studied city architecture at the University of Manchester in the U. K. Capitalizing on this academic expertise, he has worked actively for 50 years at various Japanese governmental organizations which specialize in promoting development aids as requested from developing countries. He has thereby made great contributions to the nation-building and human empowerment in many developing countries.

His father MATSUMOTO Shigeharu emphasized, immediately after the end of WWII, the necessity for Japan to establish cultural and intellectual exchange schemes for promoting international mutual understanding, and participated in the founding of the International House of Japan (IHJ) for the said objective. When his father passed away in 1989, Mr. MATSUMOTO, being the eldest son, joined IHJ, a public-interest incorporated foundation, as Executive Director.

Concurrently, Mr. MATSUMOTO started to offer cooperation to the Minato UNESCO Association. Specifically, he helped with the selection and invitation of appropriate speakers for MUA's lectures, symposiums, and annual diplomats' lectures which address only ambassadors and embassy staff based in Japan. This was possible thanks to Mr. MATSUMOTO's extensive acquaintance network.

I was always impressed with his open-mindedness, deep thinking, humane warm concern, and quick execution. It was lucky for all of us to see an ideal mode close by. I'd like to extend my heartfelt appreciation and pray for his soul to rest in peace.

How to properly give water to Bonsai could be tricky, as signified by a saying: "Watering requires three-year training." Today we pasted pieces of moss around the roots of the pine tree. This way, the instructor told us, we could check moss to see if the tree needs water. The attendee's "pine tree Bonsai" will add grace to the New Year's celebration.
